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### Preface

The book *TransMath: Innovative Solutions from Mathematical Technology* has been conceived as a powerful tool to spread and champion the transfer of mathematical knowledge and techniques to the industrial sector and society. This publication presents two technological maps, developed in the Consolider i-MATH CSD2006-00032 Project (Ministry of Science and Innovation – Government of Spain). Firstly, the i-MATH Map of Demand for Mathematical Technology (TransMATH Demand Map), with data obtained from a survey carried out with around 5,200 Spanish firms, details the level of knowledge, use and demand for mathematical technology in industry<sup>1</sup> in Spain. Secondly, the i-MATH Map of Supply of Mathematical Technology (TransMATH Supply Map) shows the experience acquired in technology transfer to business and industrial sectors by a broad representation of those Spanish mathematical research groups with greatest capacity and background in collaborating with industry.

The book is mainly addressed to those companies with innovation needs that could be met using mathematical technology. A complete list of successful industrial projects, developed by Spanish research groups, is therefore included to help readers determine the level of implementation and demand for mathematical technology in other companies and sectors of economic activity. Furthermore, it illustrates the benefits of using mathematical techniques to enhance innovation in industry.

In regards to professional readers, all information collected in this publication is classified by economic activity. Eleven sectors are considered in particular, as the majority of supply and demand for mathematical technology corresponds to companies belonging to these sectors: *Biomedicine & Health, Construction, Economics & Finance, Energy & Environment, Food, Information & Communication Technology (ICT), Logistics & Transport, Management & Tourism, Metal & Machinery, Public Administration, and Technical Services.*

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### Introduction

The research project Ingenio Mathematica (i-MATH), an initiative financed by the Spanish Ministry of Education and Science, promoted a wide range of activities for the period 2006–2012 in order to improve the role of mathematical research in the Spanish sphere of science, technology and innovation, and increase the transferal of knowledge from Spanish mathematicians to business sectors. Specifically, two initiatives were developed in order to analyse the current state of mathematical technology transfer in Spain: the TransMATH Demand Map, which studies the knowledge, use and requirements for mathematical tools by Spanish companies, and the TransMATH Supply Map, which compiles both Spanish research groups' experience in technology transfer and the key mathematical services they currently offer.

#### 1.1 Background

During the period 2006–2012 the mathematical community in Spain has contributed to a new global initiative aimed at promoting knowledge transfer from universities and public research bodies to industry. Thus, the year 2006 marked a turning point for industrial mathematics in Spain, with the launch of the project *Ingenio Mathematica*, known as i-MATH (http://www.i-math.org/). i-MATH was a CONSOLIDER singular research project for the period 2006–2012 in which a total of 350 research groups took part. It aimed to develop a complete activity research programme for Spanish mathematics, with the purpose of promoting and implementing strategic actions to increase – both qualitatively and quantitatively – Spain's mathematical presence at national and international levels.

In order to take this step, i-MATH has promoted several initiatives with a view to determining the current state of Spanish mathematics. These initiatives have provided a broad vision of current strengths and weaknesses, highlighting the need to act upon those areas in which mathematical community is not reaching its full potential, according to current economic development in the country. Furthermore, it has facilitated new progress in those areas and subjects where it already holds a significant or well-consolidated international position.

Firstly, Chap. 2 presents the main conclusions derived from the TransMATH Demand Map; a national prospectus on the level of knowledge, use, and demand for mathematical technology by industry. Secondly, Chap. 3 is devoted to the TransMATH Supply Map, which analyses the experience acquired in technology transfer to business and industrial sectors by the research groups belonging to the i-MATH project.

The purpose of mapping this technological supply and demand, and an outline of the subjects the maps cover, is described in the following article on the grant agreement that was signed with the Spanish Ministry of Science and Education to mark the start of the i-MATH project:

The design and annual update, together with the validation by an independent external committee, of a map showing the interactions and connections (both existing and potential) between mathematical research and technology transfer to the business and industrial sectors. The map will pay special attention to the detection of gaps in emerging fields, to the strengthening of existing fields, and to the identification of latent scientific-technological opportunities to be developed.

#### 1.2 Mathematical technology in demand

For the drawing up of the TransMATH Demand Map, which was developed by CESGA Node (see http://mathematica.nodo.cesga.es/) in collaboration with the i-MATH board of directors, a project was designed for detecting problems in industry for which mathematicians could provide complementary or fundamental tools to solve them, determine the demand for mathematical training, and define, where necessary, new research lines in mathematics aimed at solving these problems.

This project constitutes a highly ambitious, pioneering venture, unique in the field of mathematics, in which a survey has been carried out with around 6,716 companies of 10 employees or more, distributed throughout Spain and representing all industrial and business sectors. From this sample, a total of 5,176 companies from 10 activity sectors have been selected for this book, excluding the sectors where the use of mathematical technology is not intensive or there is no specific supply from the research groups considered. To achieve this, a panel of experts from the academic, business, and industrial sectors has provided their advice and expertise. Specialists in CAD, numerical simulation, statistics, operations research and other fields of mathematics have participated in this panel, all with experience in the transfer of technology to companies. In addition to experts in technological consultancy at CESGA Node, their counterparts in consultancy at the Department of Statistics and Operations Research from the Universidade de Santiago de Compostela have also taken part in the processing of acquired information for the most recent version of the Map.

#### 1.3 Mathematical technology on offer

To carry out the TransMATH Supply Map, a survey was developed to identify the starting point and evolution for each group taking part in the i-MATH project. The objective was to identify i-MATH groups with the capacity to transfer knowledge as well as proven experience in this field. It gave us a picture of their background in developing industrial projects, their interest in providing advanced technical training, and the range of mathematical services they offer.

The first edition of the TransMATH Supply Map was published in September 2007 on the i-MATH project webpage (see http://www.i-math.org/mapa\_consulting/). Consequently, the map was updated in 2008, 2009, 2010 and 2011, and made available on the i-MATH website. All versions are currently available on the Spanish Network for Mathematics and Industry website, math-in<sup>.net</sup> (http://www.math-in.net/), which includes technical information about the activity of each research group. This information has been shared with companies, technological parks, governments and research groups linked to the R&D world.

The results included in Chap. 3 correspond to the sixth edition of the TransMATH Supply Map, and contain updated information about capacity, resources, and technological provision of a broad representation of Spanish mathematical research groups with a more consolidated background in transfer of mathematical technology. The post-processing of data provided by the research groups has been carried out by technicians at CESGA Node.

#### 1.4 Economic activities involved in mathematical transfer

In order to facilitate the matching up of supply with demand for mathematical technology, the most noteworthy results of both the TransMATH Demand Map and the TransMATH Supply Map are broken down into sectors of economic activity. Table 1.1 shows the eleven economic activity groups which have been considered in this book.

These sectors were extracted from the European Industrial Activity Classification (NACE Rev.2), in accordance with the foreseeable applicability of mathematical

techniques. The NACE codes for the economic activities included in each selected sector can also be seen in Table 1.1.

Both the demand for and supply of mathematical technology are mainly focused on economic activities included in these eleven selected sectors. However, the *Public Administration* sector was excluded from the TransMATH Demand Map since their economic activities are not usually included in business studies, whereas the *Technical Services* sector was ruled out of the TransMATH Supply Map due to its crosssectoral nature, with corresponding services being redistributed into other sectors.

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### i-MATH Map of Demand for Mathematical Technology (TransMATH Demand Map)

The TransMATH Demand Map analyses the results of a survey of 5,176 Spanish firms belonging to ten different sectors of economic activity. This chapter presents the main conclusions of the study in relation to the level of knowledge and use of mathematical technology by Spanish companies (such as computer-aided design, computer-aided engineering, statistical and operations research tools, and other mathematical techniques applicable to industry), the presence of personnel qualified in mathematics or statistics on their workforces, their requirements for mathematical services or qualified mathematicians or statisticians, and their interest in possible collaborations with universities or research centres.

#### 2.1 Objectives and methodology

#### 2.1.1 Objectives

The main purpose of this study is to detect the requirements and problems in different Spanish business sectors in which mathematics can act as either a fundamental or complementary tool to detect new possibilities for cooperation between mathematicians and industry, to define new research lines aimed at solving these problems, and to determine the demand for mathematical training. More specifically, the objectives of the TransMATH Demand Map are to:

- determine company needs and requirements concerning the incorporation of qualified professionals into the field of mathematics;
- detect training requirements in the fields of mathematics, statistics and operations research;
- identify lines of research of interest to companies in these fields;
- explore more deeply the different uses and applications that can be made available for representative sectors of the Spanish economy;
- detect current barriers to the adoption of these techniques by companies;

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- identify the predisposition and opportunities for collaboration between companies and universities and research centres;
- make known the benefits of mathematical techniques for small, medium-sized, and large companies;
- make known to the mathematical community the needs of the business sector in this field.

#### 2.1.2 Methodology: population, sample and questionnaire

In order to carry out the study, a telephone survey of Spanish companies was conducted between March 24th and July 30th 2009. Geographically speaking, the survey covered the entire Spanish national territory.

The panel of experts which collaborated in the TransMATH Demand Map (see Sect. 1.1) carried out both the selection of the study population and the sample range, as well as the design of the questionnaire. Originally, 13 sectors of activity were selected for conducting the analysis of company demand for mathematical technology, discarding some significant economic areas which correspond to activities focused on education or to activities that are not usually covered in business studies. Of those 13 sectors surveyed, this book presents the results for ten of them (see Table 1.1 in Sect. 1.3), omitting the data corresponding to three sectors related to areas where either mathematical technology transfer is unusual, or mathematical research groups have still not developed specific supply: *Commerce, Timber & Paper* and *Miscellaneous Services* were the sectors omitted.

Subsequently, although 6,716 Spanish firms were surveyed, only the responses of 5,176 companies are analysed in this manuscript. The complete study can be consulted at the i-MATH project website, http://www.i-math.org/mapa\_demanda/, or http://www.math-in.net/.

#### 2.1.2.1 Study population

The Central Companies Directory (CCD) of the National Statistics Institute (INE – Instituto Nacional de Estadística) was adopted as the basis of the study population, updated as of January 1st 2008. However, the initial range was restricted to:

- firms belonging to ten of the eleven sectors of economic activity introduced in Table 1.1 (see Sect. 1.3), those being, *Biomedicine & Health*, *Construction*, *Economics & Finance*, *Energy & Environment*, *Food*, *Information & Communication Technology (ICT)*, *Logistics & Transport*, *Management & Tourism*, *Metal & Machinery* and *Technical Services (Public Administration* is excluded from this study);
- companies employing more than 10 people. Three groups depending on the number of employees are considered: the first corresponds to companies employing

between 10 and 49 employees; the second, between 50 and 199 employees; and the third, with more than 199 employees.

Hence, the total number of firms making up the study population described amounts to 128,341. Their distribution according to sector of economic activity and number of employees is shown in Table 2.1.

#### 2.1.2.2 Sample range

With regards to the statistical purpose of the data, the survey was designed to allow for analysis of the sample according to sector of economic activity and size of company, aspects of particular interest to this study. The size of the sample was 5,176 companies, and the type of sample employed was random sampling, with segmentation by firm size and sector of economic activity as shown in Table 2.2 which presents the sample distribution.

Regarding company size, allocation of the sample was not performed in a proportional way among the three employee strata. This was due, in the first instance, to similar levels of error being sought, which would not be possible using proportional allocation due to the large differences among the three employee strata sizes in the study population. In the second, the category of larger sized companies was considered to be of great interest for the project, since these firms often have more resources devoted to collaborative R&D projects with universities and research centres, and are usually where demand is highest for technology transfer. Using proportional sampling, larger firms would become significantly less represented in the sample range, and the study could have lost valuable information. Table 2.3 shows the distribution of the sample and study population according to number of employees. One observes that only 16% of companies in the considered study population

employ more than 50 people, whereas 50% of firms represented in the sample belong to the medium or large company categories.

Once the sample range for each company size stratum was established, allocation according to the ten selected strata of economic activity was performed, paying special attention to those groups previously selected by the panel of experts as being of greatest interest for mathematical technology transfer, such as *Biomedicine* & *Health, Economics & Finance, Energy & Environment, ICT* and *Technical Services* (see Table 2.4, where the distribution of sample range and study population by economic sector is presented). These sectors were oversampled since they are where we find the highest rate of demand for mathematical technology and the greatest quantity of users of mathematical and statistical tools; proportional allocation would reduce the presence of this category of company in the sample range.

In short, rather than basing the selection criteria for the sample size by stratum on optimality criteria (proportional sampling, minimum variance, etc.), the study population distributed by company size and sector was considered, alongside subjective criteria based on the transfer experience of the map's panel of experts in order to guarantee a reasonable representation of sectors and sizes of companies regarded as being the most strategic for this study. It is for that reason that in this TransMATH Demand Map a descriptive analysis of the sample data has been chosen, leaving the

analysis of its inference on the study population for later work, should this be necessary.

#### 2.1.2.3 Questionnaire

The questionnaire employed was designed in accordance with the specific objectives of the survey. To facilitate its application, questions were arranged in four main groups:

- 1. characterisation of company;
- 2. knowledge and use of mathematical techniques:
  - computer-aided design (CAD) and numerical simulation, usually known as computer-aided engineering (CAE);
  - statistical and operations research tools (ST/OR);
  - other mathematical techniques applicable to industry (OMT);
- 3. needs and human resources in mathematical techniques;
- 4. collaboration and outsourcing with universities and research centres.

In order to facilitate data processing and statistical analysis, the survey database was stored and analysed with the Statistical Product and Service Solutions (SPSS) statistical package.

#### 2.1.2.4 Further information

The questionnaire and detailed methodology related to this survey are available at the i-MATH project website (see http://www.i-math.org/mapa\_demanda/ and

http://www.math-in.net/), as well as in the technical document entitled *Informe Técnico del Mapa TransMATH Demanda (i-MATH Map of Demand for Mathematical Technology – Technical Report).* 

#### 2.2 Main results of the study

In this section, the statistical analysis carried out with the survey data is presented. Details of the results obtained according to company size (number of employees) and sector of economic activity are also included.

Firstly, since the choice of the sample was based on company size and sector, and a sample proportional to the real population was not considered, it was decided that a descriptive statistical analysis should be given to the sample data. This characterisation of companies is followed by a series of results concerning the mathematical techniques employed by these companies. Finally, a summary of company responses about needs and human resources in mathematical techniques, collaboration with universities or research centres, and consultancy requirements are also presented.

#### 2.2.1 Characterisation of companies: by sector, company size and department

This section includes an analysis of the distribution of the sample according to sector and company size. In addition, the percentage of companies belonging to the sample which have departments for quality control, design or technology, R&D or new product development is shown. The latter is analysed according to whether it is located in Spain or overseas.

#### 2.2.1.1 Distribution of firms by sector according to company size

It is worth repeating that sectors where economic activity is most closely related to mathematical technology transfer were oversampled, whereas sectors with a greater number of firms but previously minor interest were less represented in the sample (see Table 2.4, Sect. 2.1.2.2). Furthermore, in order to avoid giving excessive weight to small firms in the results, the proportion of medium and large-sized enterprises selected in the sample is higher than the proportion of these firms observed in the real population (see Table 2.3, Sect. 2.1.2.2).

Thus, Fig. 2.1 shows the distribution of sampled firms in each sector according to number of employees.

#### 2.2.1.2 Existence of company departments related to technological transfer

In order to detect the existence of departments in firms which in theory might be more interested in mathematical technology transfer, one of the questions in the question-naire referred to whether the company had any of the following departments:

- quality control department;
- design or technical department;
- R&D or new product development department.

From the responses, it follows that 37% of companies did not have any of these departments, whereas 52% had a quality control department, 34% a design or technical department, and 21% a R&D or new product development department.

Analysing this information by sector (see Table 2.5), more than 65% of companies whose activities involved *Energy & Environment*, *Food* and *Metal & Machinery* sectors had a quality control department. Moreover, in this latter sector, 60% of firms had a design or technical department, which is the highest percentage among all sectors. With regards to R&D or new product development departments, the most noteworthy are the *ICT* (39%), *Metal & Machinery* (32%) and *Energy & Environment* (31%) sectors. The lowest percentage corresponds to *Logistics & Transport*, where this department exists in only 7% of companies.

Regarding company size, one observes that more than half of medium-sized companies in the sample and 76% of large companies possess quality control departments (see Fig. 2.2). Both design departments and R&D departments yield lower percentages in the three groups. In general, as company size increases, the number of firms with departments of any of the mentioned types also increases. On the other hand, this relation is inverted when those firms that have none of these departments are considered: the highest proportion (46%) corresponds to the smallest companies, while this percentage decreases as the number of employees increases, falling to 17% for large companies.

#### 2.2.1.3

#### Location of R&D or new product development department

As mentioned above, among the different company departments, the R&D or new product development departments are of particular interest to this study (21% of those polled confirmed that this type of department exists in their firm). Special attention was paid to where these departments are situated, classifying the firms into three groups according to whether the R&D department is located in Spain, overseas or whether it is both overseas and in Spain. In regards to this question, the R&D department was exclusively in Spain in 86% of cases, while only 3% of companies in the survey stated that it was located overseas. Furthermore, 10% of firms said their R&D department with this department with this department did not answer the question (don't know/refusal).

In the analysis by sector, it is worth pointing out that 9% of firms involved in *Economics & Finance* had R&D or new product development departments overseas, while 16% stated that such departments were located both in Spain and overseas, yielding a result in this sector of 25% of companies with all or part of their R&D departments located overseas (see Fig. 2.3).

If the sample is divided by company size, as the number of employees increases, the percentage of companies which have all or part of the R&D or new product development department overseas also increases, ranging from 5% in small companies to 23% in the largest firms (see Fig. 2.4).

#### 2.2.2 Knowledge and use of mathematical tools: CAD/CAE, statistics and operations research, and other mathematical techniques

#### 2.2.2.1

#### Knowledge of mathematical techniques

The interviewees were asked to score from 0 to 10 their level of knowledge as regards to the possible application of mathematical techniques in their companies. Here, the scores of companies which answered the question (95% of firms) are analysed (N/A being omitted).

Of those polled, 59% awarded scores between 5 and 10 points with, in particular, 30% stating a significant knowledge of these techniques with a rating equal to or higher than 7. However, it is also worth noting that 19% scored 0 points meaning in fact, that the average score (4.5 points) does not reach the pass mark of 5 points.

In Table 2.6, it can be seen that among small companies only those belonging to the *ICT* and *Technical Services* sectors (5.3 points) attain the pass mark for knowledge of mathematical techniques. Three sectors rise above 5 points in the medium-sized company group: *Metal & Machinery* (5.9 points), *Technical Services* (5.7 points), and *Energy & Environment* (5.1 points). On the other hand, it is in the large company group where the mean knowledge exceeds 5 points, being highly valued in the following sectors: *Metal & Machinery* (6.9 points), *Economics & Finance* (6.3 points), *Energy & Environment* (6.2 points), and *Technical Services* (6 points).

When one analyses the rating by sector, the greatest knowledge of the applications of mathematical techniques addressed in this study mostly correspond to large com-

panies, followed by medium-sized companies. Furthermore, the scores of the latter are generally above those of smaller companies. Only in the *ICT* sector do small companies score higher (5.3 points) than the medium-sized companies (4.8 points), and large firms (5 points), as can be seen in Fig. 2.5.

#### 2.2.2.2 Use of mathematical techniques: CAD, CAE, ST/OR and OMT

The following sections are devoted to analysing the use, on the part of Spanish companies, of the following mathematical tools:

- computer-aided design (CAD), and numerical simulation, usually known as computer-aided engineering (CAE);
- statistical and operations research tools (ST/OR), such as data analysis techniques or decision-making support techniques;
- other mathematical techniques (OMT), for example, geographical tracking systems, signal processing, computation, biomathematics, etc.

We present the percentages in use of mathematical techniques obtained, detailing in which specific areas they are mostly required. It is also indicated whether a company's mathematical techniques are conducted internally or externally. Following this, a special section compiles some results related to the type of software used in firms when mathematical techniques are applied internally.

Firstly, the interviewees were asked about the use of CAD techniques, that is, the use of computer-aided design for designing parts, plans, images or graphs. According to data gathered in this survey, 36% of those polled stated that these types of tools are applied in their companies. As regards to the application of computer calculation programs to simulate, predict or study the behaviour of products and/or processes (often known as CAE), such as thermal studies, mechanical forces or manufacturing processes, analysis of responses indicates that 14% of firms use CAE techniques.

The diffusion of statistical and operations research tools in the field of business was also studied. From the data obtained, one observes that almost half the companies (47%) stated that they use statistical techniques, data analysis techniques or decision-making support techniques in order to conduct, for example, customer or market analysis and quality control, as well as for planning, risk evaluation, logistics, resource assignation, and process optimization.

As far as OMT are concerned, 9% of companies confirmed that they applied mathematical tools such as geographical tracking, digital imaging or signal processing; geometry, design or visualization; bioinformatics or biomathematics; searching and codification of information, or computation.

Finally, let us highlight that among all the companies in the survey only 35% stated that they did not use any of the mathematical techniques mentioned. Consequently, 3,382 companies use one or more of the mathematical techniques included in the questionnaire. Nevertheless, of all the companies interviewed, only around 2% make use of mathematical applications in all areas covered in the survey, which amounts to a total of 84 companies.

If the sample is segmented by sector, one observes that the percentage of companies that use CAD increases considerably in *Metal & Machinery, Technical Services*, and *Construction*, with more than 50% (see Table 2.7). Next, the *Energy & Environment* sector appears (45%), giving slightly lower results but still above the mean. It can also be seen in Table 2.7 that among the 14% of sampled companies

which use some type of CAE technique, the following sectors must be emphasised: *Metal & Machinery* (29%), *Technical Services* (21%), *Energy & Environment* (18%), and *Construction* (14%). The lowest value is found in those companies devoted to *Biomedicine & Health* (2%).

The most noteworthy sectors for ST/OR users are *Food* (56%), *Energy & Environment* (53%), *ICT* (52%) and *Logistics & Transport* (50%), since more than half the companies in these sectors applied statistical methods, data analysis techniques or decision-making support tools. On the contrary, the lowest percentage is found in *Construction* (33%).

For OMT, Table 2.7 shows that differences exist according to which sector the company belongs. Thus, the lowest percentages of OMT use (4%) are found in the *Food* sector, whereas the highest values correspond to *ICT* (16%), *Technical Services* (16%), and *Logistics & Transport* (13%).

When companies that did not use any of the techniques covered by the study are analysed, one finds that they belong to the following sectors: *Biomedicine & Health* (47%), *Management & Tourism* (47%), *Logistics & Transport* (44%), and *Economics & Finance* (43%). On the other hand, *Technical Services* and *Metal & Machinery* have the lowest percentage of firms that do not use mathematical tools (21% and 22%, respectively).

If the sample is divided according to the number of employees, the use of CAD (and CAE, respectively) techniques increases when the company size is larger, going from 30% (11%) in companies with fewest employees to 52% (22%) in the largest companies (see Fig. 2.6). Similarly, the percentage of firms that use statistical or operations research tools is higher in large and medium-size organisations (59% and 49%, respectively) than in small companies (41%). Moreover, as expected, the larger the firm the more they use OMT in their tasks, increasing from 7% for small companies to 14% for large companies. Finally, segmentation by company size reveals a

significant increase in the use of mathematical techniques as company size increases, ranging from 60% in small companies to 79% in large companies (see Fig. 2.6).

#### 2.2.2.3 Main areas of application of CAD/CAE, ST/OR and OMT

Next, we focus on the companies in the sample which stated that they use CAE, ST/OR or OMT, and we analyse in what areas these techniques are predominately applied in Spanish firms.

With regards to the purpose for which these companies use CAE, the interviewees were asked in which of the following areas they mainly apply CAE tools:

- mechanical or structural;
- thermal or thermodynamics;
- manufacturing processes: injection, printing, embossing, forging;
- electronics and/or electromagnetics;
- fluids: gases, liquids;
- acoustics or vibro-acoustics;
- environmental;
- other: for example, multiphysics.

In Fig. 2.7, one can observe that 53% of replies fall within the mechanical or structural fields and 37% in manufacturing processes. Note that, given the fact that the question required a multiple response, a company may have indicated one or several of the purposes and areas mentioned above.

The companies which stated that they used ST/OT tools also answered a question relating to the type of subjects or areas where statistical techniques, data analysis

techniques or decision-making support techniques applied. The possible answers to this question are detailed below:

- quality control;
- stock: control and optimization of stock;
- production processes: control and optimization of production processes;
- risk & financial analysis: analysis of risk, analysis of financial products;
- strategy, logistics & planning: strategy, decision-making, logistics, planning;
- customer/market/product studies: customer analysis, market studies, and product studies;
- exploitation of internal information: data mining, business intelligence;
- other: e.g. experimental design, clinical analysis.

Of all the companies using ST/OR in the course of their work, it transpires that 64% apply these tools to customer/market/product studies (see Fig. 2.8). A somewhat lower percentage, 50%, apply these tools to quality control, and 42% to strategy, logistics & planning. It should be noted that since the question admits multiple answers, the same company may indicate applications in several different areas or subjects.

A question in the questionnaire referred to what type of fields OMT were applied in companies using such techniques. The possible replies to this question were the following:

- digital imaging: graphs, video, animation, image recognition;
- geometric analysis: computational geometry, visualization, CAD development, symbolic methods;
- digital signal processing;
- GIS/GPS: design of geographical tracking systems such as GIS or GPS;

- communication networks;
- codification of information: cryptography, computer security;
- computation: computation, computational algebra, language processing, numerical-symbolic algorithms;
- searching/processing of information: semantic web, algorithms for the internet;
- bioinformatics: genomics and proteomics;
- biomathematics: applications to life sciences and biomedicine, such as diagnostic techniques, medical prescriptions, drug administration, tumour growth and propagation, pest control, systems biology;
- other.

Of all the companies using OMT, 47% apply these tools to digital image processing (see Fig. 2.9). A slightly lower percentage (40%) stated that they were used in areas associated with design of geographical tracking systems such as GIS or GPS, while somewhat fewer but with practically the same percentage stated that they were applied to geometric analysis (25%) and communication networks (26%). Note that, since various answers were possible in reply, different areas of application may occur within the same company.

#### 2.2.2.4

#### Internal/external use of CAE, ST/OR and OMT

In this section, companies using CAE, ST/OR and OMT are analysed, irrespective of whether mathematical techniques are employed internally, externally or both.

Figure 2.10 shows that 63% of companies in the survey use CAE on a solely internal basis, 15% of firms only use CAE externally, whereas 22% carry out CAE

both internally and externally. For companies using ST/OR tools, one may observe that 95% of companies apply ST/OR internally (80% only internally), while only 5% polled use such techniques exclusively externally. Finally, 72% of firms apply OMT tools on a solely internal basis, 7% use OMT externally, whereas OMT are conducted both internally and externally in 21% of companies.

#### 2.2.2.5 Internal use of CAE and ST/OR: type of software used

In this section, those companies that conduct CAE or ST/OR internally are considered, and a study of the type of software used (commercial software, free software or both; customized software) is carried out.

Among companies that conduct CAE internally, 51% only use commercial software, whereas 15% of companies use free software on an exclusive basis (see Fig. 2.11). The remaining firms either use commercial and free packages simultaneously (23%) or declined to answer this question (11%).

If one deals with those companies that make use of ST/OR internally, Fig. 2.11 shows that 46% of companies using ST/OR internally only use commercial packages, whereas 19% of firms use free software exclusively, and 24% work with both types of packages. As in the case of CAE, 11% of those polled did not reply to the question.

Next, we will study the use of customized programs or modules among companies which carry out internally either CAE techniques or ST/OR tools.

Figure 2.12 shows that 42% of firms conducting CAE internally use customized programs for that purpose, while 70% of companies that employ ST/OR internally make use of customized modules.

#### 2.2.3 Needs and human resources

#### 2.2.3.1 CAD/CAE and ST/OR requirements

All the companies taking part in the survey were asked if they had any requirements regarding CAD/CAE or ST/OR; for example, if they needed information about or assessment of applicability of these techniques; training; implementation, development or improvement of programs. 4% of the sample replied that they required some assistance and 7% stated that they had some requirement in statistics, data analysis or decision-making support (ST/OR requirements). Thus in the whole survey, 535 firms reported the need for this kind of tool. Their distribution by sector can be found in Fig. 2.13.

From the calculation of the percentages for each sector, the CAD/CAE requirement increases in those sectors involving *Metal & Machinery* (7%, 42 firms), *Construction* (5%, 33 firms) and *Technical Services* (5%, 31 firms). For ST/OR techniques, *Economics & Finance* with 9% (34 firms) is the sector with the greatest requirement for these types of tools in terms of percentages, whereas *Management & Tourism* and *Technical Services* are the sectors with the highest demand in absolute terms with more than 40 firms each (around 7% of companies in these sectors).

As regards to company size, no appreciable differences are found in terms of a greater or lesser degree of need for information or assessment about subjects concerning CAD/CAE: around 4% of firms in each employee stratum (100 small companies, 67 medium-sized companies, and 31 large companies). If the comparison is now made for ST/OR needs, the percentage of firms with requirements increases

slightly when the number of employees rises; going from 6% (150 firms) for small companies to 8% (62 firms) for large companies.

# Type of CAD/CAE and ST/OR requirements

Those companies that stated their need for assistance in subjects relating to CAD/ CAE were asked to classify their requirements into the following categories:

- information or assessment: information about or assessment of CAD/CAE applicability to the company;
- selection/implementation/validation of a CAD/CAE tool;
- training;
- definition or calculation of processes;
- customized development: customized development of CAD/CAE software or interfaces;
- integration of CAD with CAE or both into company processes;
- other.

Considering the 198 companies which stated a need for assistance with CAD/CAE as a basis, Fig. 2.14 shows how these companies are distributed according to their type of requirement. One may observe that 59% of such companies have requirements in information or assessment about the applicability of CAD/CAE to their company, and 53% in CAD/CAE training. Moreover, 21% of firms would be interested in selection, initial implementation and validation of a CAD/CAE solution adapted to

their needs, while 19% state requirements in customized development of CAD/CAE software.

The classification of ST/OR needs and requirements is the following:

- training;
- quality control;
- stock: control and optimization of stock;
- production processes: control and optimization of production processes;
- risk & financial analysis: risk analysis or financial products analysis;
- strategy, logistics & planning: strategy, decision-making, logistics and planning;
- customer/market/product studies: customer analysis, market studies, product studies;
- exploitation of internal information: data mining, business intelligence;
- other: for example, experimental design, clinical analysis.

Among the 337 companies which stated ST/OR requirements, the most frequently requested needs were found in the areas of customer analysis and market/product studies (41%), training (41%), quality control (32%), and strategy, decision-making, logistics and planning (29%), which in general coincide with the most widely used techniques, as seen in the previous section (see Fig. 2.15).

# 2.2.3.2 Human resources

The following sections are devoted to an analysis of whether or not the companies have personnel qualified in mathematics or statistics on their workforce, and what activities they are engaged in within the company. Analysis is also conducted into

whether the companies require some kind of short or medium-term mathematical service or qualified personnel in order to apply any of the mathematical techniques addressed in this study.

Only 9% of companies stated that they have mathematicians or statisticians on their workforce, whereas 85% of firms did not employ personnel qualified in mathematics. The remaining interviewees (6%) did not reply to this question. This represents a total of 452 companies that employ mathematicians.

Figure 2.16 provides details of the percentage of companies employing mathematicians or statisticians by sector. The higher values correspond to the following sectors: ICT(21%), *Economics & Finance* (15%), and *Technical Services* (12%). As regards to company size, the larger companies more commonly have such employees (16%) as opposed to medium-sized companies or small companies (10% and 6%, respectively).

Furthermore, Fig. 2.17 provides details of the total number of mathematicians or statisticians by sector. Bear in mind that the total figure amounts to some 1,440 mathematicians spread over the 422 companies which answered this question (equalling 93% of firms stating they have mathematicians on their workforce).

The companies which replied they employed mathematicians or statisticians were asked about the fields in which these employees were engaged. The possible options were as follows:

- business informatics or systems;
- CAD/CAE;
- ST/OR: statistics, data analysis and decision-making support;
- OMT: other mathematical techniques;
- other tasks.

Figure 2.18 shows from the analysis of the responses that mathematicians are engaged in fields associated with business informatics or business systems in 47% of companies, a percentage comparable to those engaged in statistics, data analysis or decision-making support (44%). Furthermore, in 28% of companies mathematicians are engaged in other tasks. It is important to point out that the question admitted multiple replies, so an employee engaged in other tasks may also be working at the same time in other mathematical fields.

Out of the sample of 1,440 mathematicians and statisticians employed by companies, Fig. 2.19 shows a breakdown by sector of how many of them are devoted, at least partially, to any of the tasks involving the main techniques addressed in this study: CAD/CAE, ST/OR and OMT. Thus, for example, 83% are engaged in fields directly related to their qualifications in the *Management & Tourism* sector, while this figure falls to 51% in the *Food* sector.

# 2.2.3.3 Need for qualified mathematicians or mathematical services

We now analyse short or medium-term company requirements for some types of mathematical services or the need to appoint qualified mathematicians or statisticians. Some 6% of interviewees stated that their company required mathematical services or needed to appoint personnel qualified in mathematics or statistics in order to apply one or more of the techniques considered in the survey; this represents a total of 286 companies from the 5,176 taking part in this study. 86% of firms, however, declared they did not have this type of need, and 8% of those polled decided not to answer.

Analysis by sector in Fig. 2.20 shows that the highest number of companies interested in appointing mathematical personnel corresponds to *Metal & Machinery* (41 firms, 6% of companies in the sector) and *Technical Services* (41 firms, 7% of companies in the sector). In terms of percentages, *ICT* (12%) and *Economics & Finance* (9%) are the sectors where the highest proportions of companies stated their need for some kind of service in this sphere.

When each group according to company size is compared, one observes that the largest companies give a figure of 8% (65 firms), which is 3% above the value for medium-sized and small companies (5% in both cases; 97 and 124 firms respectively).

# 2.2.4 Collaboration and outsourcing with universities and research centres

This section is first devoted to studying the collaboration and outsourcing by companies to universities or research centres over the last five years in all spheres, not just in mathematics. These collaborations include both training and research projects, and technological services. An analysis is then made of the interest shown by companies in possible collaborations with universities or research centres related to the techniques addressed in this study.

# 2.2.4.1 Outsourcing and collaboration with universities or research centres in the last five years

What follows is an analysis of those companies that, between 2004 and 2009 (the survey was carried out in 2009), collaborated with universities and research centres in training, research or technological service projects, but not necessarily in fields related to mathematics. 33% of companies sampled responded affirmatively to the question, whereas 60% of those polled indicated that they had not collaborated with universities for the last five years (7% of interviewees did not reply to the related questions).

Sectors which have had the most collaboration or external contracts with universities or research centres over the last five years are *ICT*, and *Technical Services* (with 53% and 47%, respectively), while the sector with the fewest such collaborations is *Logistics & Transport* with only 19% of its companies outsourcing (see Fig. 2.21). Regarding company size, large companies have been those most involved in collaborations during the last five years, with a figure of 48% (see Fig. 2.22). Correspondingly, only 28% of small firms have recently collaborated with universities or research centres.

#### Type of collaboration

One question in the questionnaire asked all those companies that had had collaborations or contracts with universities or research centres in the last five years, in what fields such collaborations had been conducted. The three possible replies to this question were as follows:

- training;
- services: research or technological services;
- both.

Based on the 1,721 firms that had had some type of collaboration, 78% of such cases were in the field of training and 38% in research or technological services. Furthermore, 18% of such companies collaborated with universities or research centres in both fields, while 3% declined to respond.

Figure 2.23 shows the percentages for the type of collaboration in each sector. The high degree of collaboration in training, exceeding 85%, in *Biomedicine & Health* and *Management & Tourism* (86% in both cases) is noteworthy. For collaboration on research or technological services levels are more modest, the highest percentages found in *Energy & Environment* (56%) and *Metal & Machinery* (52%). Among the sectors that have collaborated in both fields, it is worth highlighting *Energy & Environment* (23%), *Metal & Machinery* (22%), and *Food* (21%).

On the other hand, small and medium-sized companies have collaborated most in training, with figures of 79% and 77%, respectively (see Fig. 2.24). As regards to research or technological services, large firms have had most collaboration or contracts of this type (47%), and they have also outsourced most in both fields (26%).

#### **Degree of satisfaction**

Companies collaborating with universities or research centres were asked about the degree of satisfaction according to points awarded from 0 to 10. Note that 7% failed to reply with a level of satisfaction.

One may highlight that only 2% of the companies which answered the question expressed a degree of satisfaction of less than 5, while 80% expressed a high degree of satisfaction with points equal to or higher than 7. Calculation of the average number of points awarded reveals that satisfaction with collaboration is high, with 7.5 out of 10.

In the analysis by sector (see Table 2.8 and Fig. 2.25), the highest points correspond to *Biomedicine & Health*, with 7.9. Nevertheless, no appreciable differences exist between sectors, since all values are higher than 7 points. Division according to company size reveals no appreciable differences from one group to another (except in the *Logistics & Transport* sector, where rating goes from 6.8 points for large firms to 8.0 points for small firms), although large companies returned slightly lower ratings.

# Interest in collaboration and outsourcing with universities or research centres

Regarding this issue, the questionnaire asked whether companies would be interested in collaborating with universities or research centres in end-of-year projects, Masters course projects or work experience placements within the sphere of mathematics. 33% of the total replies were affirmative, 44% were negative, and 23% corresponded to firms which did not answer the question. The high percentage of N/A responses is not particularly surprising, since most interviewees also indicated that they would need more information about the type and objectives of the collaboration in order to answer this question.

It can be seen in Fig. 2.26 that the sectors most willing to enter into collaboration, in terms of percentages, are *ICT* (48%, 163 firms) and *Technical Services* (45%, 282 firms), which account for almost half of these companies, followed by *Metal & Machinery* with 38% of companies (241 firms).

In the segmentation by company size (see Fig. 2.27), the largest firms expressed the most interest in collaborating with universities or research centres, with a figure of 44% (347 firms) of all those in the sample. The percentages corresponding to small and medium-sized companies were appreciably lower (30% and 32%, respectively), although there are more companies ready to collaborate in these employee strata in absolute terms (780 and 574 firms, respectively).

#### Interest in maintaining collaboration

In this section we analyse those companies belonging to the group which replied that they have collaborated or had external contracts with universities or research centres in the last five years, and have expressed an interest in renewing that collaboration. Based on those 1,721 companies that have previously had some kind of collaboration with universities or research centres we can now reflect on their interest in doing so again, and find that 60% would be prepared to resume collaboration while 22% would not (18% declined to answer). The 60% of companies interested in collaborating again are equivalent to 20% of the total number of companies which participated in the study.

Figure 2.28 shows by sector those companies which, having previously collaborated with universities or research centres, intend to continue collaborating. In all sectors, the majority of firms that have collaborated previously stated their interest in collaborating again, above all, in the *Metal & Machinery* and *Technical Services* sectors (66% of firms). On the contrary, the lowest percentage of companies interested in collaborating again corresponds to *Biomedicine & Health*, with a figure of 50%. Regarding the number of employees (see Fig. 2.29), large and small firms showed the most interest in maintaining collaborations with universities and research centres (64% and 61%, respectively).

# 2.2.4.3

#### Interest in receiving a visit from mathematical technical staff

Those polled were asked about their interest in receiving a visit from a mathematical technical expert. This question was posed to the 864 companies stating their need for

assistance in CAD/CAE or ST/OR as well as those that used OMT. Results showed that 35% of these companies are interested in getting in touch with technical staff, whereas 54% do not wish to receive such a visit (11% of interviewees did not answer this question).

When the sample is divided according to sector, Fig. 2.30 shows the number of companies prepared to receive a visit from mathematical experts in each sector. The highest values are found in *Technical Services* (55 firms) and *Metal & Machinery* (42 firms). In terms of percentages, the high number of companies interested in receiving a visit in *Metal & Machinery* (45%), *Food* (40%), and the *ICT* (39%) sectors stand out. On the other hand, division by company size reveals no appreciable differences between small firms and medium-sized companies, with 34% of those polled interested in such visits, while large companies seem to be just slightly more interested, with a figure of 37%.

# 2.3 Conclusions

This chapter contains the analysis of a survey of the business and corporate demand for mathematical technology in Spain, which has enabled us to:

- analyse the knowledge and use of mathematics in industry;
- detect the needs and problems in different Spanish business sectors where mathematical techniques could constitute a fundamental or complementary tool;
- attract the interest of companies with a view to some kind of collaboration with universities or research centres.

Next, we summarise the main conclusions about this study related to the level of implementation of mathematical techniques in firms, and the identification of primary company needs where there is a demand for mathematical technology and services.

# 2.3.1 Use of mathematical techniques: CAD, CAE, ST/OR and OMT

Firstly, let us highlight that amongst all the companies in the survey only 35% stated that they did not use any of the mathematical techniques mentioned, that is, 65% of those polled do actually use some mathematical tools in their companies. Taking into account the number of employees, those which do use mathematical tools range from 60% among small firms to around 80% in large companies.

In first place, with a figure of 47% of all companies surveyed, is the use of statistical tools, data analysis and decision-making support techniques (ST/OR), which find their highest degree of implementation in *Food* (56%), followed by *Energy & Environment* (53%), *ICT* (52%) and *Logistics & Transport* (50%). These techniques are used above all for customer analysis and market or product related studies.

Computer-aided design (CAD) comes second, since it is used in 36% of the companies polled, particularly in the *Metal & Machinery* sector (67%). Third position, and with considerably lower values, is occupied by computer-aided engineering (CAE) with 14% of firms, the greatest degree of implementation once again being in *Metal & Machinery* (29%). This tool is applied for conducting mechanical or structural calculations in approximately half of the cases (53%).

In last place with 9% is the use of other mathematical techniques (OMT), with almost double this percentage in the *Technical Services* and *ICT* sectors (16%). In almost half of the companies using OMT (47%), these techniques are used for the processing of digital images and in 40% of cases for the design of geographical location systems such as GIS or GPS.

For all of the previous techniques, the larger the company the more extensive is their use. Specifically, the use of CAD in large companies exceeds the use in small companies by 22%, and by 14% in medium-sized firms. Similar percentages are found for ST/OR, whereas the difference is narrower where CAE and the use of OMT are concerned. The effort that many small companies are making to incorporate these tools into the course of their work is clearly demonstrated by the corresponding percentages. In fact, 60% of small companies stated that they use some kind of mathematical technique.

# 2.3.2 Use of mathematical techniques: software

Approximately half of firms only use commercial software in order to internally apply CAE (51%) or ST/OR (46%) techniques. Correspondingly, 38% of those polled which are using CAE stated that they worked (either totally or partially) with free software, while 43% of declared ST/OR users applied internally these tools (either totally or partially) by means of free packages.

Moreover, 42% of firms applying CAE internally use customized programs/modules for that purpose. This percentage reaches 70% of companies in the case of ST/OR techniques.

# 2.3.3 Requirements in mathematical tools

Only 337 firms polled stated their need for assistance in statistics, data analysis or decision-making support. *Economics & Finance*, with 34 companies, is the sector with the greatest requirement in these types of tools. The greatest demand in this area is for training (41%), and for use in customer analysis and market or product studies (41%).

Requirements in CAD/CAE, however, are found in 198 companies, the highest values being in the *Metal & Machinery* sector (42 firms). As regards to the type of requirement, more than half of such firms (59%) stated their need for information or assessment about the applicability of CAD/CAE techniques in their companies.

# 2.3.4 Human resources

With regards to human resources, 452 firms (9% of companies in the study) indicated that they had mathematicians or statisticians on their staff. In almost half of the cases, these employees are engaged in business informatics or business systems (47%) or statistics, data analysis, and decision-making support (44%).

Furthermore, 286 companies (6% of those polled) state that they require mathematical services or personnel qualified in mathematics or statistics; the sectors with the highest demand being *ICT* with 12%, and *Economics & Finance* with 9%.

# 2.3.5 Collaboration and outsourcing

The percentage of companies expressing willingness to collaborate with universities or research centres is noteworthy (33% of those polled); the highest values corresponding to *ICT* (48%) and *Technical Services* (45%).

This percentage is similar to that of those companies that have already collaborated in the last five years (33% of those polled). Such collaboration mainly took place in areas of training, where the mean degree of satisfaction expressed by the companies involved was 7.5 points (scored from 0 to 10). This is probably the reason why more than half of such firms would be prepared to collaborate again with universities or research centres.

In general, companies in the study perceive that mathematical techniques are important. In fact, 35% of firms stating their need for assistance in CAD/CAE or ST/OR as well as their use of OMT would like to be contacted by mathematical technical experts.

# 2.3.6 Main conclusions

From the previous conclusions, we can suggest that there is a certain level of implementation of mathematical knowledge, and that companies are aware of this. For example, in large companies the mean knowledge exceeds 5 points out of 10, reaching the highest rating in *Metal & Machinery, Economics & Finance*, and *Energy & Environment*. Nevertheless, it is difficult to evaluate to what extent companies use of mathematical techniques goes beyond the purely instrumental (use of spreadsheets or standard statistical packages in their most basic functionality, for example).

Moreover, we believe that there remain many companies which are not aware of industrial applications of mathematics or the advantages that might arise by including mathematicians or statisticians on their staff. We believe that the reality of this situation is not fully appreciated by either the community of mathematical researchers or industry, where it is often thought that mathematics are far removed from the industrial and business worlds. However, mathematics is in fact becoming increasingly interdisciplinary, appearing in contexts in which it is difficult to be separated from other spheres of knowledge, and giving rise to industrial applications with greater frequency.

It is also very important to point out that around one fifth of companies in the survey stated that they had a R&D or new product development department. Such departments are highly correlated with technological transfer in the industry. Furthermore, a high percentage of companies are prepared to collaborate with universities and other research centres. Even more noteworthy is that most of these companies have previously participated in this type of activity in recent years. The conclusion seems clear: if companies collaborate with universities, and they are satisfied with the obtained results, then they wish to repeat the experience. Thus, further efforts must be made to overcome the obstacle posed by what appears to be a lack of knowledge in some companies about the possibility of participating in such collaboration. In fact, the upmost requirements of those polled are related to training and assessment of application of mathematical tools in their firms. To achieve this aim, dissertations, post-graduate projects and even doctoral theses carried out by new mathematicians can help to bring about closer relations with companies. Experience shows that this

kind of timely relationship, linked to higher education and training, can lead to fruitful collaboration in the field of innovation and research.

Finally, let us remark that there still remains a long way to go in bringing mathematical technology to a greater number of firms, and, above all, that cases in which this has been successfully achieved should be made more widely known in order to increase company receptivity to these opportunities, since at present only a small number of companies are truly aware of its potential.

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# i-MATH Map of Supply of Mathematical Technology (TransMATH Supply Map)

This chapter presents the supply and expertise offered in mathematical technology transfer by the 62 research groups belonging to the i-MATH Consulting Platform in 2011. Firstly, a general characterisation of the groups and an overview of each of them (contact information, research lines, etc.) are given. Then the main areas of mathematics in which the research groups are currently working are listed. Finally, the supply of mathematical technology and the current expertise of the 62 groups are shown by sector. In particular, detailed information about consulting and training expertise offered by the research groups is presented classified by sector, as well as their expertise in software development and use of free and commercial software.

# 3.1 Objectives and methodology

# 3.1.1 Objectives

This study aims to identify capacity and expertise in the transfer of knowledge and technology to industry from Spanish mathematics research groups which belonged to the project *Ingenio Mathematica*. The main objective was to develop a map of capabilities that would integrate detailed information on the most representative groups working to create partnerships and interact with companies in different industrial sectors.

Overall, the TransMATH Supply Map aims to achieve several objectives, mainly directed at two types of stakeholders or target readers:

 A wide range of business and commercial firms, as well as non-profit R&D organisations, in order to present a complete document that puts forward new information on mathematical, statistical and operational research techniques and their application in the improvement of processes and products in industry. The map seeks to fill knowledge gaps in industry regarding areas of work in which collaboration with mathematical groups is possible. This lack of knowledge, identified in previous studies within an overall European context<sup>1</sup>, has been evaluated from a Spanish perspective through a survey conducted to produce the TransMATH Demand Map, as well as tracking interaction with businesses during the development of the i-MATH project for the entire period 2007–2012. The set of actions carried out have shown that highlighting possible areas of collaboration to companies yields a strong corporate demand for mathematical technology to solve real industrial problems. The map aims to significantly increase collaborations between research groups and industry, solving new problems and meeting unresolved needs to strengthen the competitivity of companies.

• The mathematical community at large, and those researchers and scientists from other disciplines with an interest in mathematical knowledge transfer to industry in particular, can use the Map to view aggregate information about the research lines in which Spanish groups are currently working. In addition, from the data on industrial demand of mathematical techniques, it is easy to identify new areas of research oriented to the needs of business but not yet covered by Spanish mathematicians.

# 3.1.2 Analysis of research groups

The first edition of the TransMATH Supply Map was published in 2007. Since then, four new editions have been completed, with several updates in 2008, 2009, 2010 and 2011<sup>2</sup>. The survey used as a basis for the information contained in this chapter can be found in the complete study, at the i-MATH project website, http://www.i-math.org/mapa\_oferta/, or http://www.math-in.net/. It was disseminated to all regions of Spain, among all i-MATH groups integrated in the Consulting Platform. This Platform was formed by the Spanish mathematical research groups with most experience in industrial mathematics and it aimed at increasing the use of mathematics in the manufacturing sector. During the life of the i-MATH project, intense activity to promote relationships between universities and companies has been developed. Through this intense activity a great number of collaborations with industry have emerged.

The annual increase in the number of research groups integrated into the Consulting Platform that took part in consecutive editions of the map is showed in Fig. 3.1. For the last two editions, the data collection has been performed using a web tool that allows research groups to easily incorporate their technological supply. Information about the last edition of the map, the use of the website, and deadline for submission was sent to all groups on July  $22^{nd}$  2011. Since this date 62 responses have been re-

ceived from the groups, out of which 8 correspond to new groups and the remaining 54 to updates.

Charts and tables contained in the following sections of this chapter include information about all 62 research groups integrated in the i-MATH Consulting Platform in 2011. All of them took part in the survey.

# 3.1.2.1 Characterisation of research groups: university or research centre

The 62 research groups, which participated in the Consulting Platform in 2011, belong to 31 Spanish universities or research centres as can be seen in Table 3.1.

In this table the acronyms of the research groups that will be used throughout this chapter are shown. More detailed descriptions of each group, such as contact information or main research lines, can be found in Sect. 3.2.

# 3.1.2.2 Characterisation of research groups: Spanish regions

Figure 3.2 shows the regional distribution of the 62 research groups. As the chart shows, there is a wide distribution throughout the regions, with representation of groups in all regions across the country.

The regions Galicia and Catalonia contain the highest number of groups (10 research groups); followed by Andalucía with 9; and Madrid and Valencia with 7 and 6 groups, respectively.

# 3.1.2.3 Characterisation of research groups: staff distribution

The 62 research groups that took part in the survey bring together over 620 researchers and support staff. Regarding the distribution of members of staff (permanent and temporary staff, and research fellows), the staff percentage distribution is shown in Fig. 3.3.

The majority of staff are permanent members, with a figure of 472 (76%), compared to 73 temporary members of staff and 75 research fellows (12% each). In fact, 58% of research groups include research fellows and 44% of groups include temporary members of staff.

# 3.1.2.4 Characterisation of research groups: main MSC research areas

Figure 3.4 allows us a brief analysis of the main research areas where groups which belonged to the Consulting Platform have experience in technological supply to industry by means of competitive research projects, direct contracts with companies, or training.

It can be seen that the main research areas correspond to *Operations research and mathematical programming* (37%, 23 groups), *Statistics* (31%, 19 groups), and *Numerical analysis* (27%, 17 groups). In order to summarise, Fig. 3.4 only presents those MSC (Mathematics Subject Classification) research areas with more than 5 groups involved. Complete information and more details about MSC classification can be found in Sect. 3.3 of this chapter.

# 3.3 Mathematical techniques and MSC classification

The 62 groups involved in the survey are working in various areas of mathematics. Together they offer a large range of mathematical, operations research and statistical techniques, representing the experience they have gained over their many years of work.

The main mathematical techniques in which the groups demonstrate transfer experience are detailed below. All these techniques have been incorporated into the overall provision available for transferring mathematical techniques to industry, and have been classified in three main categories, which were considered in the Trans-MATH Demand Map (see Chap. 2):

- CAD/CAE: computer-aided design and numerical simulation, usually known as computer-aided engineering (see Table 3.2);
- ST/OR: statistical and operations research tools, such as data analysis techniques or decision-making support techniques (see Table 3.3);
- OMT: other mathematical techniques, for example, geographical tracking systems, signal processing, computation, biomathematics, etc. (see Table 3.4).

It should be noted that the following tables are not exhaustive lists of all the mathematical techniques that research groups understand and handle, but a brief overview of the main mathematical tools which they have used in direct contracts with industry and training courses in recent years.

# 3.3.1 MSC classification

To sort the research activity of each group according to a classification scheme widely used by the research community, they have been categorised according to the 2010 version of the Mathematics Subject Classification (MSC2010).

Table 3.5 lists the MSC areas relating to the research activity of the groups in the Consulting Platform. For each MSC area, the groups which have participated in research projects, contracts, training or other transfer activities related to this area, are also included. It should be noted that our database contains information about related MSC research areas for only 64% of projects, 44% of contracts and 40% of training courses. For this reason, the information presented in this section is not as complete and exhaustive as we would have liked, since it was taken from only around 52% of the transfer activities developed by the research groups.

It is observed that most of the groups that have taken part in this study have developed transfer activities classified into the following MSC areas: *Operations research*  and mathematical programming (90-xx codes), *Statistics* (62-xx codes), and *Numerical analysis* (65-xx codes), as was highlighted in Fig. 3.4 (see Sect. 3.1.2).

For each of the previous MSC areas, Fig. 3.5 shows the distribution of projects, research contracts, and training according to MSC classification. It should be highlighted that each of them can be associated to several MSC areas simultaneously. In order to simplify the chart, only MSC areas where more than 10 transfer activities had been conducted are presented (the figures for the remainder of the research areas were added in the *Other areas* category). Again, the MSC areas of *Statistics* (62-xx), *Operations Research and Mathematical Programming* (90-xx), and *Numerical Analysis* (65-xx) are highlighted, since most transfer activities carried out are partially or entirely related to them.

# 3.4 Expertise by sector: consulting and training

Mathematics provides a fundamental toolkit and a universal framework for innovation. The cross-cutting nature of mathematical and statistical techniques has favoured its interaction with a large number of industrial sectors. This section shows the extensive experience in knowledge transfer broken down by sector of economic activity for all research groups that took part in the survey. Information is presented both on an aggregate basis and itemised by research group. For each sector, a list of companies and industrial organisations which established partnerships for transferring knowledge or technology from those groups is included.

The data contained in this section is related to the ten sectors previously identified in Sect. 1.3. Each group of aggregate data refers to one of these main sectors of application. It is noteworthy that the full versions of the map have identified a total of 23 economic sectors for transferring mathematical techniques. These sectors were selected from previous reports (TransMATH Supply Map 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2010 editions), and later summarised for the preparation of this book. To do this, some areas have been created adding several economic sectors and others, considering both their lack of presence in the study of the demand and the lack of supply in knowledge transfer by groups for these sectors, have been either discarded (*Defence, Heritage Management & Conservation*, and *Livestock*), or instead included in one of the ten

sectors considered (*Agriculture*, *Marine Resources & Aquaculture*, and *Space*). In this last case, the consulting and training experience of the research groups was relocated as follows: knowledge transfer activities in *Agriculture* were distributed among *Biomedicine & Health*, *Energy & Environment*, *Food*, and *Logistics & Transport* sectors, depending on each activity and the type of companies involved; contracts and training courses in *Marine Resources & Aquaculture* were included in *Food*; and *Space* groups' experience now appears within the *Metal & Machinery* group.

Before putting forward the research groups' expertise for each sector of activity, a general overview of this experience in knowledge transfer in recent years (specifically, the period 2000–2010) is presented below, as well as a summarised review of the most recent research activities developed by the various groups.

Later, a graphical representation of global experience versus supply is shown, and the complete list of contracts and training courses in which the research groups have participated can be found broken down for each sector of economic activity. It is worth noting that these last items compile the complete information contained in the Consulting Platform database, that is, they are not restricted to the period 2000–2010.

# 3.4.1 Research activity from 2000 to 2010: overview and characterisation

Firstly, it must be highlighted that the 62 groups in the Consulting Platform have participated in 514 competitive research projects, 411 direct contracts with firms and 173 training courses. From them, around 90% of projects and contracts, and 70% of training courses were developed from 2000 to 2010. Thus, the following overview is focused on this period.

Restricting the analysis to 2000–2010, research groups have developed 467 competitive research projects, 375 direct contracts with companies and 121 training courses. In addition, it is noteworthy that 103 of the research projects developed (about 22%) have been supported in some way by a company. The global distribution of all these research activities (963 altogether, including projects, contracts and training) is shown in Fig. 3.6.

Furthermore, it must be emphasised that 40% of the 62 research groups have developed research projects supported by industry and 63% made direct contracts with companies, whereas 35% of groups have conducted training courses for companies during the period 2000–2010.

Since both contracts and training are those research activities most aimed at transferring mathematical technology to industry, the following subsections are devoted solely to them.

# 3.4.1.1 Consulting and training (2000–2010): participants and duration

The 375 direct contracts with industry were developed by 39 of the research groups in the Consulting Platform (63%) for 197 different companies. The average duration of these contracts was 387 days. In fact, 34% of contracts had durations of more than a year.

As regards the training courses, it is noteworthy that 1,440 people from 70 different firms assisted them, their average duration being 27 hours. Moreover, 22 groups from the Consulting Platform (35%) developed this type of transfer activity during the period 2000–2010.

# 3.4.1.2 Consulting and training (2000–2010): by sector and research group

Figure 3.7 shows the total number of contracts and training courses for each sector during the period 2000–2010. Note that some of these knowledge transfer activities are associated simultaneously to several sectors of economic activity. Therefore, the sum of both contracts (474) and training courses (161) is higher than the values that we previously mentioned (375 contracts and 121 courses).

It is important to also note that most contracts and training courses carried out in that period are aimed at the *Public Administration* sector, with more than 90 contracts and 45 courses, the *Energy & Environment* sector, including 75 contracts and 12 courses, and the *Metal & Machinery* sector, with a figure of 65 contracts and over 20 training courses.

The distribution of the number of contracts and courses carried out in the period 2000–2010 for each research group is presented in Fig. 3.8 and Fig. 3.9 respectively. In all, 39 groups have carried out direct contracts, whereas 22 groups have participated in training courses with companies and industrial organisations within the

period in question. We should state that, in some contracts, several groups participated simultaneously. Specifically, 7 contracts were developed jointly by two research groups. Due to this fact, the sum of the number of contracts in Fig. 3.8 is 382 instead of 375, since these 7 contracts have been counted twice (once for each group involved).

In terms of contracts with industry, modestya, mat+i and EE are the research groups which present the highest values, with 111, 43 and 27 contracts, respectively. Regarding the number of training courses, modestya, GEUVA and DEPREN are the most experienced research groups.

## 3.4.1.3 Consulting and training (2000–2010): time evolution

Figure 3.10 represents the number of current contracts and courses per year during the period 2000–2010. The trend is clearly upward from 2000 to 2008, corresponding to a closer engagement observed in recent years between industrial organisations and mathematical research conducted in Spanish universities. Nevertheless, the figures have significantly decreased since the beginning of the economic crisis in 2008 affecting, above all, the number of direct contracts with industry.

# 3.4.2 Technological transfer: supply and experience

A total of 50 of the 62 research groups (81%) have proven experience in knowledge and technology transfer to industry by means of research projects with industry, direct contracts, training courses and other knowledge transfer activities. It should be noted that, although the experience in knowledge transfer to industry is not particularly high for most groups, the values are significantly increased if considering the potential supply, as shown in Table 3.6 below, which represents both experience and provision, differentiated by sector. They show that the supply capacity of all groups significantly exceeds their proven experience.

As we have just mentioned, Table 3.6 summarises expertise and the current supply on offer for each group by sector. Cells marked with "x" refer to sectors in which groups offer technological services and have proven experience (whether in projects with industry, contracts, training or other knowledge transfer activities), whereas cells marked with "o" show those sectors where groups offer technological services but do not currently have expertise available.

Following this, information related to contracts and training courses developed by the research groups in the Consulting Platform is detailed by sector of economic activity. We should remark that each contract or course was assigned to just one main sector (that with which the contract or course is most related), with secondary related sectors also indicated. For each sector, the main applications of mathematical technology in this field are described. Subsequently, the lists of clients and research groups involved in the development of contracts and training courses, as well as the titles of those contracts and courses developed within the main sector of interest, are presented. It is worth highlighting that in distributing activities by region, 51% were carried out by Galician research groups (198 contracts and 97 training courses), 8% by groups from Castile and León (27 contracts and 17 training courses), 7% by groups from Navarra (41 contracts and 1 training courses), 6% by groups from Valencia (18 contracts and 17 training courses), and 5% by Catalonian research groups (27 contracts and 3 training courses).

*Biomedicine & Health* represents 11% of total supply from the groups and also 10% of proven experience in terms of contracts and training. The research groups have developed 28 contracts and conducted 33 training courses for this sector sector (reaching a total of 40 contracts and 39 training courses if the secondary sector *Biomedicine & Health* is also included), mostly related to data analysis and statistical studies for hospitals and health policy-makers. *Energy & Environment* represents 12% of the total supply from the groups and 15% in terms of proven experience (being the second sector with the largest number of contracts and courses, after *Public Administration*). In the Consulting Platform database, 79 direct contracts with industry and 11 training courses were recorded by the research groups for this sector (reaching a total of 90 contracts and 20 training

The *Metal & Machinery* sector represents 10% of the total supply from the groups and 14% in terms of proven experience, constituting the third most representative sector according to experience. Specifically, 62 contracts were developed and 22 training courses were conducted by research groups in this sector (reaching a total of 72 contracts and 25 training courses if the secondary sector *Metal & Machinery* is also included), covering a range of projects related to the field of materials, naval engineering, aeronautics and automotive engineering, many of them focused on CAD/CAE and numerical simulation techniques. ## 3.5 Expertise in software development

Most of the methods and mathematical techniques applied to different sectors of economic activity shown in the previous section lead to the development of customised software packages for solving the existing challenges and needs in companies.

The use of custom-made software is normally required by companies, since it simplifies the use of solutions developed based on advanced mathematical techniques. Furthermore, it includes user-friendly interfaces to facilitate the use of technical solutions for a wide range of skill bases and end-users and, in many cases, a training course for the company staff required to work with the customised package. Therefore, the development of specialised software is an essential part of the work of research groups engaged in knowledge transfer.

This section contains a description of proprietary and free software developed by the research groups that took part in the survey. Among the 111 software packages developed by the research groups in the Consulting Platform, 39 of them were transferred to industry. Therefore, as in the previous section, a list of clients is presented below. The research groups with proven expertise in the development of customised software are shown, as well as a complete list of software developed by them. # 3.7 Conclusions

The analysis and update of the information extracted from the survey included in this chapter have been a priority among all knowledge and technology transfer activities developed in the i-MATH project between 2007 and 2012. This study, along with the TransMATH Demand Map, has provided the basis of necessary information for the successful execution of almost all knowledge transfer activity in industrial mathematics carried out in Spain during those years.

The study has enabled us to:

- identify the most representative Spanish groups in industrial mathematics and create their portfolios of capacities and technologies;
- bridge the gap between Spanish mathematicians and companies, highlighting to industry potential areas of cooperation in which Spanish groups are particularly strong;
- unite the Spanish mathematical community working in knowledge transfer, thus improving its relationship with companies, through the promotion and identification of new possible collaborations and research lines which may be of interest to industry.

The map has also established the basis for the creation of two new structures aimed at fostering industrial mathematics in Spain:

- the Spanish Network for Mathematics and Industry, math-in (www.math-in.net), which aims to increase the presence of mathematical methods and techniques in the manufacturing sector by bringing together all Spanish research groups, which have an interest in mathematical knowledge transfer, with industry;
- the Technological Institute for Industrial Mathematics, ITMATI (www.itmati. com), whose primary objective is to enhance competitiveness and innovation in companies, operating as a centre of excellence in industrial mathematics on an international stage.

In this section, we summarise the main conclusions about this study related to the supply of mathematical techniques and expertise by all the 62 Spanish research groups in the Consulting Platform, which represents over 620 researchers and support staff working together for the benefit of industrial organisations.

## 3.7.1 Expertise in mathematical techniques

The joint expertise of the groups particularly stands out in the case of three specific areas of research, using the MSC classification. Firstly, the 90-xx MSC area, *Operations research and mathematical programming*, with 23 groups (37% of research groups in the Consulting Platform), to which are of particular importantance mathematical programming and optimization techniques. Secondly, the 62-xx MSC area, *Statistics*, with 19 groups (31%) with demonstrable relevant experience. Most noteworthy is the use of techniques such as data mining, time series or multivariate analysis. The third most important MSC research area is *Numerical analysis*, MSC area 65-xx, with 17 groups (27%), the most relevant areas of research being mathematical modelling and numerical simulation.

Techniques which stand out amongst those most widely used by groups in the Consulting Platform are techniques in fluid mechanics within CAD/CAE research (such as hydrodynamic flow simulation, computational fluid dynamics (CFD) or aerodynamic simulation); routes planning and optimization, and strategy and planning in logistics and transport, in the statistics and operations research area (ST/OR); and, regarding other mathematical techniques (OMT), development in software and computational applications.

Although the distribution of techniques encompasses the three main areas of expertise (CAD/CAE, ST/OR and OMT), the level of expertise in the field of statistics and operations research should be particularly emphasised due to the large number of groups participating in the survey showing an in-depth knowledge in this area of research.

## 3.7.2 Research activity aimed at knowledge transfer (2000–2010)

From the information taken from the survey for the period 2000 to 2010, it is clear that there was significant activity in knowledge transfer carried out by research groups. In total, more than 960 different types of collaborations with industrial partners have been identified, among them, the development of research projects in cooperation with companies, the execution of contracts for knowledge-intensive services to industry and the running of industrial training courses. It should be noted that the sample of groups that took part in the survey included the most active groups in the Spanish context of industrial mathematics, since they have all been active in mathematical transfer activities promoted by the i-MATH project. Moreover, data analysis

shows that most of the activity is concentrated in a few groups with long experience in industrial mathematics.

If we make a breakdown by type of collaboration, during the period 2000–2010, the 62 research groups developed a total of 476 competitive research projects, which obtained funding through public calls at regional, national or international levels. Nevertheless, only 103 of them were supported, at least partially, by companies and industry bodies. Thus, the percentage of research projects in collaboration with companies versus the total research projects developed from 2000 to 2010 (only 22%) reflects the distance between research and industry, most research activity carried out by the groups during this period being conducted far away from the direct demands of companies.

However, the high number of direct contracts with companies and industry bodies held in that period is of significance. Groups have executed a total of 375 contracts for knowledge-intensive technology services, as well as a number of training courses for technology organisations or firms (121 courses). In this sense, it is important to highlight that some contracts have continued year on year, giving rise to long and fruitful relationships between the company and the research group: the former increases its profit applying innovative mathematical tools, whereas the latter transfers knowledge to industry and society and discovers new mathematical research lines with high (and often unknown) demand in business sectors.

Regarding the economic sectors in which contracts and training courses were most prevalent, *Public Administration, Energy & Environment* and *Metal & Machinery* are the most remarkable sectors. Furthermore, as far as the territorial distribution of the groups which developed direct contracts and training courses with industry is concerned, these knowledge transfer activities are concentrated in regions such as Galicia, Castile and León, Navarra, Valencia and Catalonia.

#### 3.7.3

#### Consulting and training: expertise by sector

As for experience in each industrial sector of economic activity, the largest numbers of research groups with proven experience were found in *ICT*, *Energy & Environment* and *Metal & Machinery*. When performing an analysis by number of collaborative activities in each sector (considering contracts and training as a whole), *Public Administration, Energy & Environment*, and *Metal & Machinery* sectors stand out.

Considering both contracts and training courses, we observe that the *Public Administration* sector ranks first in both cases. The relevant representation of this sector is mainly due to the demand, from regional or national institutions, of services such as design and analysis of surveys, statistical data analysis or social studies.

The second largest sector where there is notable interaction in terms of contracts is the *Energy & Environment* sector; while in terms of training courses it is *Biomedicine & Health*. These results are explained by taking into account the demand for knowledge-intensive mathematical services by companies that operate primarily in the *Energy & Environment* sector, especially in mathematical modelling and numerical simulation, and statistical techniques aimed at controlling processes and making predictions. As for training courses, the *Biomedicine & Health* sector stands out, with a high demand for courses related to statistical data analysis, applied primarily by hospitals and health policy makers.

From the analysis of information by sector, it can also be concluded that during the period considered, groups focused a significant part of their research in matters of social and economic investigation in accordance with priorities established in national government research programs and corresponding regional governments. Such programs are often the main source of funding for groups' activities.

Collaborations between research groups and industry are, however, becoming ever more common, as the increment in the number of direct contracts and training courses from 2000 to 2008 shows (see Fig. 3.10 in Sect. 3.4.1.3). Unfortunately, the economic crisis has held this evolution back during recent years and in the final years of the study. Nevertheless, due to the willingness and disposition of firms and research groups to continue collaborating, it is expected that as the economic situation of companies improves, the current status will revert back to the positive trend observed pre-2008.

## 3.7.4 Software development and use

The development and use of software for the application of mathematical and statistical techniques is essential. Therefore, research groups developed a total of 111 software packages; of these, 35% have been transferred to companies or industrial organisations. Most of the software not being transferred was developed in the framework of individual research projects carried out by the groups. In terms of expertise in handling free or commercial software, the groups show experience in using more than 95 software packages, among them the most widespread mathematical and statistical software.

At this point, it is important to note the increasing demand for training courses related to the use of mathematical and statistical packages, both free and commercial software and customised modules were developed by the research groups, most of them adapted to the specific needs and requirements of the company or client.

## 3.7.5 Expertise vs. supply

When analysed, for each sector of activity, the number of groups with proven experience in mathematical technology transfer (which have developed projects, contracts, training courses or other knowledge transfer activities) versus the number of groups that offer services, the available supply of all groups significantly exceeds the proven experience. This reflects, on the one hand, the variety of fields of possible application of the techniques developed, which can be used across different sectors and, on the other, the gap between the groups' capabilities and resources and that proportion of them that is finally concreted in collaborations with industry.

Although this difference is observed in all sectors without exception, it should be noted, for example, the very high percentage of groups that offer knowledge transfer in *Construction* without having proven experience in this sector (44%): 16 groups offer services, but only 7 have expertise. On the contrary, 92% of groups which offer technological services in the *ICT* sector have developed some kind of knowledge transfer activity with industry in this field.

## 3.7.6 Demand vs. supply

In Chap. 2 a global overview of the demand for mathematical technology in Spanish industry was presented, while Chap. 3 has been devoted to the supply of mathematical technology by Spanish research groups. Below, Fig. 3.11 compares the distribution by sector of the 286 firms which stated their interest in mathematical services or qualified mathematicians or statisticians (see Fig. 2.20, Sect. 2.2.3.3) and the distribution by sector of the technological supply offered by the research groups in the Consulting Platform (see Table 3.6, Sect. 3.4.2). Bear in mind that the *Public Administration* sector had been discarded in the demand survey, while *Technical Services* was not considered for technological supply.

Analysis by sector shows that the highest percentages of companies interested in mathematical services correspond to *ICT*, *Metal & Machinery* and *Technical Services* (14% each), whereas the majority of mathematical supply is focused in the *ICT* (19%), *Energy & Environment* (12%) and *Public Administration* (12%) sectors.

In general, it seems that technological supply and demand are reasonably balanced across economic sectors, although the demand for technological services is higher than supply in some of them, for example, *Construction, Economics & Finance, Food, Management & Tourism,* and *Metal & Machinery.* Correspondingly, *Biomedicine & Health, Energy & Environment, ICT,* and *Logistics & Transport* stand out among the economic sectors where the percentage of technological services offered exceeds the percentage of firms with mathematical needs.

Special attention must be paid to the *Technical Services* sector, since this field represents the 14% of firms which demand mathematical technology but, for the time being, where research groups do not supply specific mathematical services. This fact suggest that efforts must be made to put firms in the *Technical Services* sector in contact with research groups in order to transfer mathematical techniques for application in this field.
